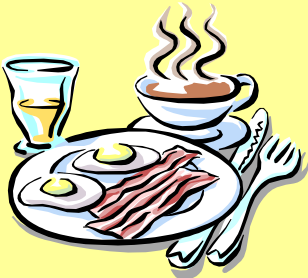

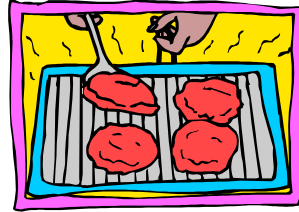

Continued Problem with Pets

We would like to commend the dog owners who have complied with the Standing Rules and to thank owners for cleaning up any waste left by their dogs. The Club grounds are cleaner because of their efforts. The issue of dog owners who bring their dogs to the Club and let them run off their leash while their owners are inside or in other parts of the Club was brought up at the May Board Meeting. The dogs defecate on the property and the owners do not clean up their mess. Some members are irritated that dogs are off leash and on the patio when food is being served. If the member has their dog off leash, the member should be with the dog to supervise it.

A motion was approved that if any pet owner is in violation of Club Standing rule 4.0, their pet will be suspended for 1 month from the Club. Any Club Officer or Board member can claim the violation. Members can claim the violation through either a Club Officer or Board member. Animals must not be tied up on the back porch at any time.

Todd Groessl has installed a dispenser in the patio (East side) with Pet Waste Eliminator Bags. This should make it easier to pick up after the dogs. Thanks Todd!

Note: Standing Rules.—4.0 Pets. Only SDMBB&SC members may bring pets on premise. Dogs, cats and other domestic animals must be on a leash or caged. During special hours pets may be allowed to run free provided that the pet owner is present and pets are in good health. No more than 3 pets per membership during the hours of 3PM to 9PM (Monday through Friday) and the hours 9AM to 9PM (Saturday and Sunday). Owners are responsible for cleanup after any pet they bring to the club. Pet owners must abide by San Diego County and City of San Diego regulations for animals. Pets are not allowed in the interior Club-house with the exception of those approved by the State of California and San Diego County for the impaired. Pets are not allowed on National holidays, on the patio when food is being prepared and served from the patio or during other special events as designated by the board of directors. Pet owners will be responsible for any damage, repairs, maintenance or legal fees that are a direct result of actions by the owners' pets. SDMBB&SC reserves the right for additional compensation for damages, fines, assessments and legal fees. Pet owners shall not hold the SDMBB&SC responsible for the health of their pets or actions by their pet or other pets brought to the club.

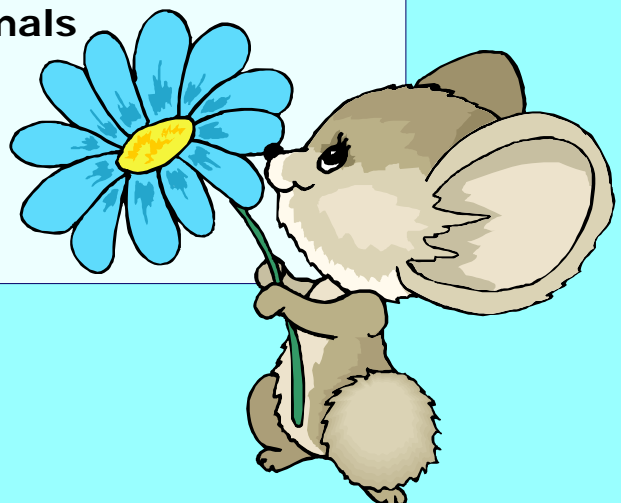

The SDWST has been USA's Western Region Club of the Year in 1999, 2000, 2002 and 2003. In 2001, we were recognized as the USA Water Ski Club of the Year.

The purpose of this organization is to bring together the citizens of San Diego County who have a common interest in the sport of waterskiing. Corps Regulations Keep Boaters Safe

LOS ANGELES – The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Los Angeles District has designated an area offshore from the Naval Air Station North Island small arms range as a naval danger zone.

The 206-acre fan-shaped area, located near the entrance to San Diego Bay, south of Zuniga Jetty and east of Point Loma, provides an appropriate and enforceable zone and protects people and property from the dangers associated with munitions that may ricochet into the Pacific Ocean during small arms firing.

“This determination illustrates the role of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers’ Regulatory Program in regulating the nation’s aquatic resources,” said David Castanon, chief of the District’s Regulatory Division. “Just as we do with permit applications for developments or infrastructure, we evaluate requests for the establishment of navigation danger zones. I believe we struck the proper balance between the training needs of the Navy, the public’s need for safe navigation and the interests of the fishing industries.”

Capt. Yancy Lindsey, commanding officer of Naval Base Coronado, highlighted the critical nature of the range and the actions taken to place the public’s safety at the forefront.

“The NBC small arms range plays an important role in training Navy personnel. It is also a vital regional asset,” Lindsey said. “We worked closely with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and members of the public to understand the multi-use nature of the waters off of North Island and establish the danger zone to protect the public and military during range use.”

To ensure safe use of the danger zone by the public, the Navy will provide advance notice of its intention to use the range through VHF-FM radio communication, websites, warning flags and flashing red lights.

The danger zone is not considered safe for vessels or individuals when live firing is in progress. When warning flags or flashing warning lights indicate live firing is scheduled or about to begin, all vessels will be required to expeditiously vacate the danger zone.

Anchoring by any vessel within the danger zone is prohibited. The anchorage along the Zuniga Jetty is not affected by the establishment of the danger zone.

The danger zone will be open to fishing and general navigation when no weapons firing is scheduled, which will be indicated by the absence of any warning flags or flashing lights on land.

The majority of yacht and sailboat racing occurs within San Diego Bay and southeast of Zuniga Jetty. While coordination between the U.S. Coast Guard and the range will be necessary, no loss of organized yacht racing areas or sailing courses is expected.

The far west end of the danger zone is located about 1,000 meters east of the entrance to San Diego Bay. Navy munitions experts say design and safety features will prevent ricochets from exiting the range with the exception of a rare ricochet that may reach the danger zone. The danger zone is configured to contain these rare ricochets.

When live firing is about to be undertaken or is in progress during daylight hours, three large red warning flags will be displayed at the top of the flag poles on the southern berm of the small arms range, so as to be clearly visible from all points of entry into the danger zone.

Prior to conducting live firing, Navy personnel will visually scan the danger zone to ensure that no vessels or individuals are located within it. Any vessels or individuals in the danger zone will be notified by the Navy Range Safety

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Officer using a marine VHF-FM marine radio and by other means as necessary to exit the danger zone and remain outside the area until conclusion of live firing. As new technology becomes available, the VHF-FM marine radio communications system may be updated.

The Navy will post safety observers in accordance with range standard operating procedures at all times when the warning flags or flashing lights are displayed. Operation of the small arms range will only occur when visibility is sufficient to maintain visual surveillance of the danger zone and vicinity. In the event of limited visibility due to rain, fog or other conditions, live firing will be postponed until the danger zone can be confirmed clear of all vessels and individuals.

From 1959 to 2008, the Navy operated the small arms range consisting of two firing areas: a 12-lane pistol range and a 10-lane rifle range, each 25 yards in length. The targets are backed by a 20-foot-high berm, and each range has an 18-foot-high berm along the edges. During operation, about 1,000 military personnel use the range for small arms qualification every month. The range routinely operated 360 days per year, during which time the Navy implemented and observed safety measures to prevent potential ricochets from exiting the range.

In 2008, after an internal safety review, the Navy voluntarily closed the range for the purpose of formally establishing the danger zone. Although there have been no known public safety incidents since it was constructed, the Navy elected to suspend operations until a danger zone was formally established.

During the naval danger zone designation process, the Corps sought and considered information from the U.S. Coast Guard, the National Marine Fisheries Service, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the California Coastal Commission, Indian tribes, the San Diego Water Board, the California Department of Fish and Game, local agencies, marine businesses, recreational communities and the general public.

The Corps also considered public concerns about safety, navigation, anchoring, sportfishing, bait fishing, lobster trapping, yacht racing and local economics. The project was modified to provide increased communication between Naval Base Coronado and the marine community.

"The Sportfishing Association of California appreciated collaborating with the United States Army Corps of Engineers and the Navy in meeting the Navy's needs for military training and providing accessibility to mariners and the public," said Ken Franke, president of the Sportfishing Association of California.

The final rule associated with the use of the naval danger zone was published in the Federal Register on May 12, 2010 and may be found by searching "Title 33, Part 334, Section 866" at the website <http://ecfr.gpoaccess.gov/>.

The Corps website (<http://www.spl.usace.army.mil/regulatory>) for Special Public Notices also shows the naval danger zone location and lists the final rules associated with the use of the naval danger zone.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration anticipates publishing nautical chart 18773 indicating the location of the designated danger zone in August. The chart may be purchased at: <http://www.nauticalcharts.noaa.gov> or at a local distributor.

Naval Base Coronado will maintain a schedule of live firing at the small arms range on its website, <http://www.cnic.navy.mil/Coronado>, which will be accessible to the public. Information on live firing schedules and coordination for community concerns can be obtained by calling the Naval Base Coronado Small Arms Range Safety Officer at 619-545-8413 during normal working hours. Assistance is also available via the Naval Base Coronado Hotline at 619-545-7190 or the Naval Base Coronado operator at 619-545-1011. If the phone numbers are changed, they will be updated on the base website. The Navy will maintain the website on a year-round basis and update information as needed for public safety.

Technical data (see attached graphic):

The fan-shaped danger zone extends westerly into the waters of the Pacific Ocean from a point on the beach at 32 degrees 41 minutes 13 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 45 seconds west longitude; then easterly, along the mean high water mark, to 32 degrees 41 minutes 14 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 32 seconds west longitude; then southerly to 32 degrees 40 minutes 31 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 12 seconds west longitude; then westerly to 32 degrees 40 minutes 25 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 43 seconds west longitude; then northerly, landward, to the point of origin. The length and width of the naval danger zone is determined by the range of the most powerful weapons used at the facility.

The west flag pole indicating live fire is located on the southern berm at 32 degrees 41 minutes 21.5 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 42.8 seconds west longitude; the middle flag pole is located at 32 degrees 41 minutes 21.7 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 40.9 seconds west longitude; and the east flag pole is located at 32 degrees 41 minutes 22.4 seconds north latitude, 117 degrees 12 minutes 38.7 seconds west longitude.

Recipe Corner - Top Secret Restaurant Recipes Submitted By: Wendell Neves

Chevy's Fresh Salsa

(Makes 2 cups)

Whip out the food processor and fire up the grill because you'll need these essential tools to clone one of the best restaurant salsas in the business. The key to recreating the flavor is to fire roast the tomatoes and jalapenos, and to add a little mesquite-flavored liquid smoke.

- 6 medium tomatoes
- 6 to 10 jalapenos (use more if small)
- ¼ of a medium Spanish onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 tablespoons white vinegar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 ½ teaspoons liquid mesquite smoke

1. Preheat your barbecue grill to a high temperature.
2. Remove any stems from the tomatoes, then rub some oil over each tomato. Leave the stems on the jalapenos and rub some oil on them too.
3. Place the tomatoes on the grill when it's hot. After about 10 minutes, place all of the jalapenos onto the grill, in about 10 minutes turn the tomatoes and peppers. When almost the entire surface of the peppers has charred black remove from the grill. The tomatoes will turn partially black; when the skin begins to come off they are done. Put peppers and tomatoes on a plate and let them cool.
4. When tomatoes and peppers have cooled, remove most of the skin from the tomatoes and place them into a food processor. Pinch the stem end from each of the peppers remove any skin that has burned, place the peppers into the food processor with the tomatoes.
5. Add the remaining ingredients to the food processor and puree on high speed for 5 to 10 seconds or until the mixture has a smooth consistency. Place the salsa into a covered container and chill for several hours or overnight so that the flavors develop.

Margaritaville Key Lime Pie

(Makes 8 servings)

Beautiful thick key lime pie like the one served at Jimmy Buffet's Margaritaville Restaurants

- 2 cups sweetened condensed milk
- 6 egg yolks
- 2/3-cup key lime juice
- 1 graham cracker pie shell

Mango Sauce

2 11.5-ounce cans Kern's Mango Juice

Raspberry Sauce

- 1 ½ cup water
- 2 cups frozen raspberries
- ½-cup granulated sugar

Garnish

- Canned whipped cream
- 4 thin lime slices, halved

1. Preheat oven to 325°
2. Use electric mixer on medium speed to combine sweetened condensed milk, egg yolks and lime juice. Mix until ingredients combined.
3. Pour filling into graham pie shell and bake on middle rack for 20 minutes or until filling jiggles only slightly when shaken. Cool. Cover pie and chill in refrigerator for a couple of hours before serving.
4. Make mango sauce by bringing two cans of Kern's mango juice to a boil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes or until sauce thickens. Cover and chill.
5. Make raspberry sauce by combining water and raspberries in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil then reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Use potato masher or large spoon to crush the raspberries as they boil. Strain raspberry seeds from water, then put liquid back into saucepan and add sugar. Bring mixture back to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes or until sauce thickens. Cover and cool sauce until you are ready to serve the pie.
6. Prepare dessert by dribbling some mango sauce and some raspberry sauce onto a small plate. Place a slice of pie onto the sauce; add a dollop of whipped cream to the top of the pie slice with one half of a thin lime slice on top of the whipped cream.

Third Annual Menehune Camp By: Gus Cervantes

Aloha kakou - On the weekend of August 20-22nd Ikuna Koa Outrigger Canoe Club will have its third annual Menehune Camp which is a fun filled weekend campout at the Mission Bay Boat & Ski Club. This camp will include Hawaiian Arts, Crafts, Dance, Culture, Kanikapila, Talking Story, and of course hoe wa'a (*canoe paddling*).

The Menehune Camp is the yearly highlight of the Hawaiian cultural immersion program based around Hawaiian outrigger canoe paddling known as the Ikuna Koa's Na 'Opio Camp. This program was conceived six years ago at kahakai Ka Lae Pohaku (Rocky Point Beach) home of the Kihei Canoe Club located on Maui, Hawai'i. After getting the blessing from his Kumu, Kimokeo Kapahulehua, aka "Uncle Bully", Uncle Gus founded the program three years ago at Ikuna Koa. Each year the 'opio (youth) work on a different cultural craft. Three years ago our na 'opio (youths) made their own "Ipu" and decorated it.



An Ipu is a Hawaiian musical instrument often associated with Hawaiian Hula and is made from a gourd. Last year the 'opio got to make a "Kekoa Makaki'i" (*warrior mask*) helmet sometimes referred to as Makini (*gourd mask*) or Ikaika (*strong*) helmet which are also made from a gourd. This year's special craft project is a surprise so you will just have to read about in a future issue of the Scuttlebutt. Of course our 'opio will get to enjoy watching culturally related movies, games, and of course da kine grindz



(*delicious food*) which Uncle will be cooking in an imu (underground oven) which will include pua'a kalua (kalua pig) and laulau. Lau lau is food wrapped in ti leaves and cooked in an imu. Of course breakfast will include our famous taro pancakes and Uncle's favorite Portegeee contribution to Hawai'i, da Hawaiian donut known as the Malasada! One of Uncle Gus' missions in life is to perpetuate the Hawaiian culture and values to our 'opio. This campout is kama'aina style (*local Hawaiian style*) meaning it's not just for our kamali'i (*children*) but also for their makua (*parents*) and all members of our hui wa'a (*canoe club*). In the Hawaiian culture we honor our kamali'i and kupuna (*children and grandparents*) therefore we do most things together. Uncle Gus is one of the founders of a non-profit called "Pacific Islander Community Development" whose mission is to bring health wellness resources to the children and the elderly

in the Pacific Islander community here in San Diego and beyond. He is also the Cultural Preservation Chair and the Youth Development Chair for the Southern California Outrigger Racing Association (SCORA) and is a member of the Hawaiian Outrigger Canoe Voyaging Society on Maui Hawai'i and the head coach of Ikuna Koa Outrigger Canoe Club. Uncle Gus and all of the kamali'i and makua are forever grateful to the Mission Bay Boat and Ski Club and Uncle Gordo Parham who helped champion our Na 'Opio program to the Mission Bay Boat & Ski Club three years ago.

Ikuna Koa Outrigger Canoe Clubs welcomes all Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders and those who are Hawaiian/Pacific Islander at heart. The only qualification is that you must have aloha! Uncle will not let you in the wa'a without it!

The By-Laws have been included in the July and August 2010 editions of the Scuttlebutt. The Proposed Changes will be presented at the August 17th Flag Meeting for a final vote. The following By-Law changes were unanimously approved by the Officers and Board Members (present) at the June 10, 2010 Board Meeting. The approved proposed changes are outlined in the letter below.

To SDMBB&SC Officers and Board Members, By-Law Committee By: Todd Groessl Chairperson

The committee to update the SDMBB&SC By-laws to include designated partners on limited athletic memberships has come to the following recommendations.

ARTICLE III – MEMBERSHIP, Section 7, part 2 of the bylaws should be altered from:

2) Limited Membership (Class 2)

a. Athletic Association – a single individual that is a member of the SDMBB&SC for the intended purpose of participating in his or her sport-related activities. See SECTION 13.

Proposed change to read:

2) Limited Membership (Class 2)

a. Athletic Association – a single individual, and their designated partner, that is a member of the SDMBB&SC for the intended purpose of participating in his or her sport-related activities. See SECTION 13.

Furthermore, ARTICLE III – MEMBERSHIP, Section 13 of the bylaws should be altered from:

SECTION 13 – Limited Athletic Membership: Applicants must be proactively participating and or enrolled in an athletic program under the direction of the Athletic Association (AA) at the SDMBB&SC and must be sponsored by the AA. Limited Athletic Membership privileges entitle the member use of the Athletic Association's exercise equipment, supplies and access to the SDMBB&SC premises during all scheduled events. The AA of the SDMBB&SC is established to provide sporting activities for all members. A Board of Directors governs the AA, which oversees all of its activities. The Board of Directors of the AA is responsible for administering allocated funds and shall provide monthly reports to the Board of Directors of the SDMBB&SC.

Proposed change to read:

SECTION 13 – Limited Athletic Membership: Applicants must be proactively participating and or enrolled in an athletic program under the direction of the Athletic Association (AA) at the SDMBB&SC and must be sponsored by the AA. Limited Athletic Membership privileges entitle the member and their designated partner the use of the Athletic Association's exercise equipment, supplies and access to the SDMBB&SC premises during all scheduled events. The AA of the SDMBB&SC is established to provide sporting activities for all members. A Board of Directors governs the AA, which oversees all of its activities. The Board of Directors of the AA is responsible for administering allocated funds and shall provide monthly reports to the Board of Directors of the SDMBB&SC.

The following are the requirements necessary to change the current By-Laws:

BY-LAWS: (Current - Amended Jan. 2009)

ARTICLE XV – AMENDMENTS

SECTION 2 - Additions, changes or deletions to the By-Laws must be presented in writing to the Board of Directors by the appointed committee chairperson or representative. The Board of Directors must review and provide the committee with written comments, concerns and or recommendations within 14 calendar days after receipt if necessary. The Board of Directors must present these new or modified By-Laws to the Flag for vote without modification, unless mutually agreeable to the committee chairman or representative.

SECTION 3 - These By-Laws may be amended or revised, or new By-Laws may be adopted when two-thirds (2/3) majority of eligible members "present and voting" vote at any regular meeting of the Flag Membership. Proposed Amendments are to be published in the Scuttlebutt not less than 30 calendar days prior to vote.

Notes from the Financial Secretary By: Corey Mitskevich

As Financial Secretary here are a few things that I've discovered that you may find interesting:

- \$25 Monthly assessment – For whatever reason, this phenomenon creates the most confusion, especially on your monthly statement. Each month, your statement will include an assessment charge, regardless. Your statement will also include a deduction for the same months assessment, depending if you have met the \$25 requirement. If you have only spent a portion of \$25 (maybe \$15) then that amount is deducted and you are still responsible for the remaining amount.
- How do you make sure that SDMBBSC knows how much you spent at the club each month? This is a good question. The bartenders maintain a list of each member and track spending throughout the month. Then, the list is provided to our accountant and he makes the adjustments accordingly. It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to make sure the bartender knows your name and documents your spending accordingly. Why? They don't know everyone's name; it is best that you remind them. Also, ask for a receipt from the bartender too, if necessary. This will help you keep track of your spending and how close you are to meeting the Monthly assessment requirements. NOTE: we have all new bartenders.

Overall, the SDMBBSC is enjoying a great summer! Get down to the club, get out on your boat and enjoy.

Boat Yard Updates: By : Frank Van Schuylenburch

The City requires all boats and trailers to be currently registered. If you've forgotten to put the sticker on your boat and trailer please come down and do it. If it isn't currently registered, you need to bring it up to date. Please be sure your boat conforms to Club rules.

Club Yard Rules:

Insurance: rules apply to all boats and trailers that are kept at the club Boat Storage

Requirements: Minimum of \$100/300 Thousand Liability insurance.

List the Club as "Additional Insured".

Provide "Proof of Insurance" to the Club.

Provide copy of "DMV Registration" to Club.

Vessel and trailer Registration Stickers must be current and on the boat.

Trailers & boats must be operational i.e.; tires aired up, etc

Boat Storage Rental Agreement must be current.

Boat Storage is limited to members only and designated Satellite groups.

Remove weeds and trash around boats regularly

No Fueling or repairing boats on premises

Boat Storage to contain no junk, personal property, liquids (water) of any type or Hazardous materials (oil & etc.).

No painting of boats on premises

Tie down tarps, replace worn tarps, and remove water standing in boats and repair flat tires.

Remove all debris including boat parts.

No canopies allowed.

No new sheds to be moved into the boat yard spaces

Storage Lockers acceptable and not to exceed 3" H x 6" L 4 x W.

Areas around boat and fence to be maintained

Abandoned Boats, Trailer and equipment to be removed



New members with boats are to be moved in with approval of the Boat Yard Chairperson; they must have the proper paperwork and be members of the Club. Boat Spaces are available BUT LIMITED!

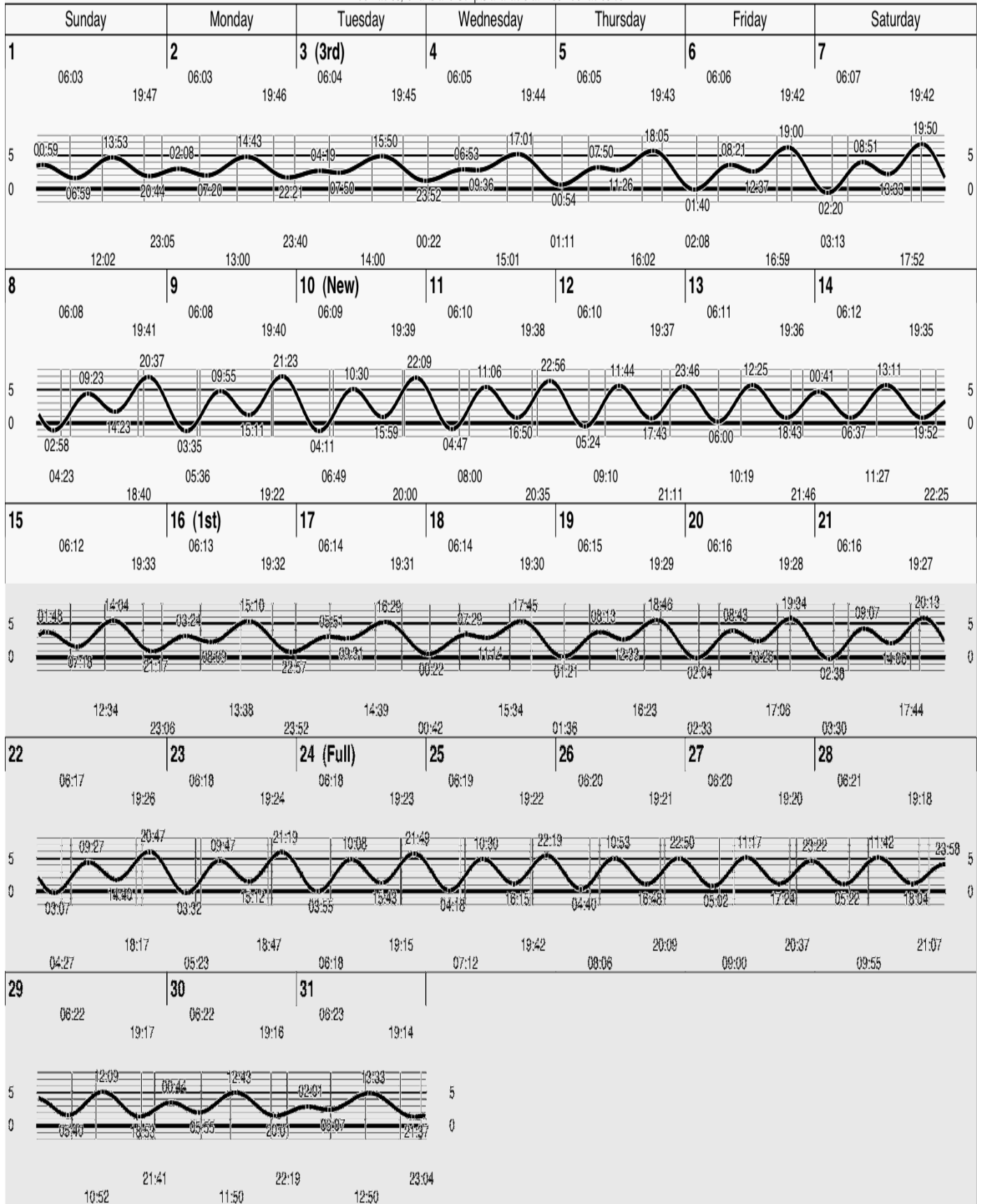
